A Community of Prayer

The story of Scripture is the story of families who struggle, of those who grapple with sin and face doubts, fears and uncertainties. St. Paul reminds us that families can overcome such struggles if together they embrace the new mode of life found in Christ. Like the families in the New Testament, modern families are called to welcome the presence of God into their homes through common prayer and increased family devotion. In this manner, families become the domestic churches they are meant to be.

A School of Faith and Charity

Domestic churches are sanctuaries from the hardship of the secular world, a place where, protected and guided by their parents, children grow in maturity and grace. Parents, by their word and example, pass on their faith and provide an environment for the discernment of truth and the practice of virtue. *Gaudium et Spes*, the pastoral constitution on the Church in the modern world, teaches that “with their parents leading the way ... children and indeed every-one gathered around the family hearth will find a readier path to human maturity, salvation and holiness” (48).

A Mission of Evangelization

In the Synod of Bishops’ document on the pastoral challenges of the family, we read, “Evangelizing is the shared responsibility of all God’s people, each according to his ministry and charism.” The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* teaches that families are of primary importance as centers of living and radiant faith. Through the witness of family life we present the most effective form of evangelization: “a Christian life lived with charity and faith” (USCCB, *Disciples Called to Witness*).

EACH FAMILY IS CENTRAL TO THE NEW EVANGELIZATION

The phrase “domestic church” has been used to describe families since the beginning of Christianity. In his *Letter to Families*, St. John Paul II explained, “The Fathers of the Church, in the Christian tradition, have spoken of the family as a ‘domestic church,’ a ‘little church.’”

Today, the Church still uses this unique description, saying, “The family is, so to speak, the domestic church. In it parents should, by their word and example, be the first preachers of the faith to their children; they should encourage them in the vocation which is proper to each of them” (*Lumen Gentium*, 11).

More precisely, a domestic church is a Christian family that, strengthened by the graces of the sacrament of matrimony, lives together in a community of prayer; learns about the faith, human virtue and Christian charity; and helps evangelize the world.
